Ammons Offers Six Classes – Block Schedule

Classes are 1 hour and 50 minutes

Ammons rotates odd days and even days: Periods 1-3-5 are on one day. Periods 2-4-6 is the following day.

What do students wear to school?

The **IB MYP Mission** is to help students become caring, knowledgeable, and open-minded thinkers who understand and respect different cultures. It aims to create lifelong learners who are prepared to make a positive impact in the world through critical thinking, global awareness, and responsible action.

TRANSPORTATION

Our recruitment area spans a 27mile radius and encompasses over 100 elementary schools. There are 30+ buses transporting our students to and from school every day.

Transportation



***All Ammons Middle School students are automatically assigned to a stop if they are eligible for transportation by Miami-Dade County Public Schools.

Ammons bus routes go:

North to Bird Road – South to Homestead

East to the water and west to the everglades

***Please note that students that live less than TWO miles from school are considered walkers and are not eligible for transportation.

ACADEMIC HONESTY POLICY

Academic honesty is the quality of being honest about the work you submit, how you completed it and how you help others in their efforts to complete assignments. At Ammons Middle School we place a high value on honesty and this extends to all work submitted by students: home learning assignments, projects, quizzes, and tests. Our expectations are that students demonstrate the IB Learner Profile characteristics especially Integrity and Principled. All members of the AMS IB Community need to be aware that the school treats academic dishonesty as a very serious matter.

The academically honest student:

DOES

- Acknowledge help from parents and peers
- Acknowledge the sources of direct quotations and key ideas
- Cite reference materials such as books and websites in a works cited / references page
- Know what constitutes cheating and abides by the rules
- Follow all exam rules

DOES NOT

- Use notes or reference materials during a test unless allowed by a teacher
- Copy from another student's work
- Hand in work as his/her own that is partly or entirely someone else's work
- Do assignments for another student
- Offer another student his/her own work to copy.

Students at Ammons Middle understand that plagiarism (presenting another person's work as your own) constitutes theft and fraud, and is classified as a Level 2 Behavior in the Miami-Dade County Public Schools Code of Student Conduct. MYP students receive instruction in information literacy, and understand that copying another person's work, cutting and pasting from the internet, and using images or other media without crediting the source, all constitute plagiarism. They learn to avoid plagiarism by acknowledging the source of any passage, sentence, key idea, image or other media that they use in their work. They learn to use quotation marks to indicate that they are using someone else's words, and to acknowledge the author. They practice strategies such as note-taking, paraphrasing, summarizing, and citing sources, in order to use written information appropriately.

Consequences

According to the MDCPS Code of Student Conduct, cheating and other forms of misrepresentation are considered Level II Behaviors because they significantly interfere with the learning and/or the well-being of others. With a LEVEL II Behavior at least one of the following procedures/consequences are acceptable:

- Work will be graded Z (no credit)
- Parent/guardian contact
- School-based program that focuses on modifying the student's inappropriate behavior or promotes positive behavior (Administrative detentions and/or parent/child night counseling sessions)
- Suspension from school for one to five days
- ** For repeat offenders the principal may authorize the use of PLAN III for Level II infractions.

Advice for Students

To insure that you are being academically honest we recommend that you:

- Take notes and paraphrase what you read
- Cite the sources where you get your information
- Plan and work ahead
- Ask questions when you are unsure or need help

Service & Action Reference Sheet

Service & Action is incorporated into the Individuals and Societies class to encourage students to think of themselves as thoughtful members of the local community and the larger world. The Service & Action Logs will be checked and collected by your Individuals and Societies teacher. Logs are due on or before the deadline of

Service & Action Hours

There are two ways to achieve your Service & Action hours:

- You may participate in the many Service & Action projects here at Ammons and be awarded Service & Action hours for your participation in projects which take place *outside of school hours*. You must receive permission from Mr. Wilson or Ms. Perlman before participating in Service & Action outside of school. In addition, a letter from the organization must be obtained containing the number of hours you completed and an explanation of the Service & Action you provided.
- You may get involved with activities in your community along with your family/parents/guardians. Most non-profit organizations sponsor a variety of service activities that will allow you to earn hours.

Service & Action Do's and Don'ts

<u>Do's</u>

Ask yourself two questions to determine if what you are planning is acceptable service and use these questions to guide your reflections:

- 1. How will this help the community at large?
- How can I make a difference?

The organization should be a non-profit group that services the broader community. ***Avoid clumping hours together. Log each entry separately, clearly indicating:

- Date & Hours
- 2. Authorized signature & Supervisor's phone number
- If you need additional logs see Ms. Perlman in the Main Office.

Make sure that your parent or guardian signs the completed Service & Action log verifying that you participated in the activities, but not as an activity supervisor.

<u>Don'ts</u>

The following activities WILL NOT be accepted as Service & Action Activities:

- babysitting, walking pets, mowing the lawn, and general chores for your family
- Going to work with parents, relatives or friends is a great career shadowing experience, but not service

Parents **MAY NOT** sign for Service & Action hours. The individual from the organization who supervised the activity must sign the log.

If you are in doubt or would like to create a service project using one of the above activities you **must get** prior approval from **Ms.** Perlman or your Individuals and Societies teacher. *Points will not be awarded after the fact.*

As part of the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme curriculum, students are required to reflect on the question, "How can I help others?" Completing Service & Action hours and a log is one of the requirements for students to receive an I.B. Certificate at the end of 8th grade. Students must log each activity and verify hours with a supervisor signature, letter and/or certificate. Pictures are suggested, but not required. (Parents may not verify hours.) Examples include, but are not limited to: tutoring, cleaning parks and beaches, volunteering at animal shelters, walk-a-thons, volunteering at hospitals and nursing homes, preparing care packages, school beautification, volunteering at homeless shelters, after-school care, and many more.

Students should complete a **Service & Action Reflection Form** according to the grade requirements for their Portfolio. This form is available in the main office or on the school website (www.ammonseagles.com/ib-portfolio)

The minimum required hours are as follows:

- 6th grade: 10 hours
- 7th grade: 15 hours
- 8th grade: 20 hours

Portfolio Guidelines

8th Grade DEADLINE:

The questions below relate to your Portfolio. Please read them closely to be sure you are meeting all of the Portfolio requirements.

<u>Why do I keep a Portfolio</u>? At Ammons, Portfolios serve a dual purpose. They provide you, the student, with a medium for pulling together work that links to the International Baccalaureate (IB) Global Contexts. They also make you an active participant in the evaluation of your progress by having you reflect on work selected for the portfolio.

<u>What goes in my Portfolio</u>? You will build your Portfolio over your three years at Ammons. In eighth grade, to receive the Ammons International Baccalaureate Middle Years Program Certificate, your Portfolio must contain the following items including the information requested:

- a) A Student Information Sheet
- b) Annual Service & Action Logs
- c) Service & Action Reflection form(s) for each year according to grade level requirement
- d) Selected work linked to Global Contexts
- e) Portfolio Student Reflection Form for work submitted
- f) Reading Reflection Form(s) according to the grade level portfolio requirement
- g) Evidence of: Family Involvement, Extra Curricular & School to Work Activities

<u>When do I put work in my Portfolio</u>? You can select work that links to Global Contexts, complete a reflection form, and place the work in your Portfolio during portfolio weeks.

<u>What kind of work can I select</u>? You may select class work, home learning assignments, assessments, or projects. If the project is too large to fit in your Portfolio, you may attach a photo to a written description of the project using the appropriate form. Be sure all work in your portfolio has a date and attach a Portfolio Student Reflection Form.

Where do I keep my Portfolio? In a binder, at home, in a safe place.

<u>What are Portfolio Weeks?</u> There will be several Portfolio Weeks throughout the year when you will collect work for your Portfolio in each class. During these weeks, you will review the contents of the Portfolio and add or remove items. During the last Portfolio Week of the year, you will finalize the work to remain in the Portfolio, being sure that each Global Context is represented as indicated by grade level. Other work will be returned to your class folders.

<u>Who grades my Portfolio</u>? Your Portfolio will be evaluated in your Individuals and Societies class as a requirement for earning the International Baccalaureate Certificate in 8th grade. Be sure that all required items listed above are included. You will be able to take your portfolio with you when you move on to high school.
